

Providing Access to Needed Family Planning Services

"B" is 31 years old. She was married at age 14 and gave birth to her first child a year later. She now has five children.

B and her family left Syria four years ago and settled in Diyarbakir in eastern Turkey. Their life in Turkey has not been easy because of the difficulty her husband has had in finding employment. He finds work as an occasional laborer, and their 16-year-old son sells packets of paper tissues on the street.

KAMER, a Turkish NGO that is a UNFPA implementing partner, conducts home visits to Syrian refugees like B. Informed about the services that KAMER offered, B decided to visit the NGO's local center. There she met with the center's doctor and confided her desire not to become pregnant given the family's difficult situation. The doctor explained the advantages of different family planning methods. With this information, B was able to make an informed choice that a long-lasting method, an intrauterine device (IUD), would make most sense for her.

A staff member from the KAMER center went with B to the local Turkish family planning health center. Because of the language barrier, Syrian refugees sometimes have difficulty in accessing the services available to them, such as family planning. With the KAMER worker there to help her, B had an IUD inserted free of charge.

During the home visit, the KAMER outreach worker also found that the children in the family were suffering from a skin disease. The worker accompanied the family to the public hospital and helped them to access the treatment they needed. As a result of the outreach, B and her family now regularly use the KAMER center where they have access to psychosocial support services, medical support and social activities.










SYRIAN ARAB REPUBLIC FROM ALL CHANNELS

JORDAN

In order to mark the successful completion of the Phase 2 of inter-agency Hemayati project, UNFPA hosted a round table meeting on 22/03/2017. As key stakeholders in this project, the Ministry of Social Development (MoSD), the Jordan Women's Union, the Norwegian Embassy, UN Women, UNFPA and UNICEF participated in the meeting. The Round Table identified key programme and advocacy areas for 2018.

On 6th March, 2017 UNFPA participated in the Gender Theme Group (GTG) meeting and agreed on key inputs of UNFPA in the GTG AWP 2017 to be shared in UNCT Annual Retreat.

The Reproductive Health Sub Working Group (SWG) meeting chaired by UNFPA was held on 23rd March, and attended by 22 reproductive health members from Ministry of Health, other UN and humanitarian agencies and National and international NGOs. Main issues discussed included male involvement in supporting available SRH services in camps and urban settings, focus on neonatal care, strengthening postnatal visits and ensuring neonatal examination visits during postpartum period. In addition an invitation was shared with all members to attend the Interagency working group meeting organized by MENA IAWG, UNFPA/ASRO and IPPF to be held in Amman during the first week of April 2017.

The Youth Task Force (YTF) in Zaatari camp, chaired by UNFPA and cochaired by NRC, conducted a field exchange visit to International Relief and Development (IRD) and Fundacion Promocion Social de la Cultura (FPSC) to attend an event on inclusivity of youth with disabilities at the community center. The YTF also completed the 2017 Work Plan for Zaatari camp with strong youth participation.

UNFPA Youth Staff participated in the two day Regional EdTech Event in Amman as part of the No Lost Generation platform and supported organisations applying for seed funds in developing their proposals, with a particular lens on adolescent girls.

TURKFY

The SGBV Working Group meeting took place in Ankara on the 30th of March with the participation of the Ministry of Family and Social Policies, UNHCR, UNFPA, UNICEF, UNW and AFAD (The Disaster and Emergency Management Authority). UNFPA also attend the Protection Working Group meeting in Ankara on the 21st of March, where the updates on the activity info were provided and the priority areas for harmonization of activities were discussed.

UNFPA attended the Protection and Health Working Group meetings . UNFPA co-chairs the SGBV Sub-working Group meeting in Gaziantep, where the 2017 final sectoral objectives and outputs were reviewed and activities to be conducted were discussed. The health Working Group Meeting and the Inter-Sector Working Group Meeting were held on the 14th of March in Gaziantep.

In the Health Working Group Meeting, the head of migration health department from Ministry of Health provided updates on the current health campaigns and the role of I/NGOs in the Health sector for the 2017. The Inter-Sector Working Group finalized the 2017 operational priorities and the operational work-plan for South East Turkey.. The Protection Core Group meeting was held in Gaziantep on the 15th of March, composed of the lead of the Protection Sector (UNHCR) and the co-leads of the SGBV (UNFPA) and Child Protection (UNICEF) Sub-Sectors and 4 elected members from the field, where the activities for the Protection and SGBV work plans were discussed and defined.

SYRIA

Highlights of International Women's Days & Mother's Day Activities

On the occasion of International Women's day, UNFPA in partnerships with local partners, i.e. Relief & Development center (RDC), AL Batoul and Aoun NGOs conducted a wide range of activities. These activities aimed at empowering women and raising awareness through life skills such as decision making and self-confidence as well as gender equality in the governorates of Homs, Hama, Tartous and Aleppo.

In cooperation with Aoun NGO internal and outreach activities targeting around 200 women were conducted for ten consecutive days in Homs, including focus group discussions and raising awareness sessions on gender equality, youth roles during the Syria crisis and the problems that citizens in Homs are facing. In addition to that, recreational activities for approximately 100 women and youth in the women's safe spaces and the collective shelters took place as well.

In cooperation with Relief & Development center (RDC) two days of first aid training--including theoretical and practical exercises for first aidwere organized for 330 women in Homs, Rural Homs, Rural Hama, Rural Damascus and Aleppo. The training was followed by honoring the most active participants.

In cooperation with AL Batoul in Tartous internal and outreach activities were organized to include Recreational activates and awareness session regarding gender equality with in women safe spaces targeting around 160 women. AL BatouL Mobile team has also reached several collective shelters in Tartous & Rural Tartous to conduct gender equality sessions.

On the occasion of Mother's Day, AL Bir & Social Welfare NGO in Hama visited the Elderly Home and presented some gifts to them.

AL Bir & Social Welfare NGO in Hama honored women who have distinguished roles in their local communities and participated in a forum discussion sessions on the importance of women's role in society.

The Reproductive Health team of the Pan-Armenian Charitable Society in Al Hassake visited the committee "My friend" for people with special needs. They celebrated with them on the occasion of Mother's Day where they presented some gifts to the children and their mothers in recognition of their efforts and contributions to their local communities.

TLIPKEY - CPOSS BOPDER

The GBV sub-cluster finalized and endorsed the 2017 work plan and strategy after thorough consolation with members. Additional focus on monitoring and evaluation, mapping and providing guidance on mobile service provision, and

providing guidance on programme closure was added.

UNFPA in collaboration with the GBV sub-cluster coordinated a training on Case Management for PSS Providers in Emergencies, the training involved 9 participants (7F,2M). Key topics included GBV case management, phases of emergencies, GBV case management system, GBV case management steps in emergencies, GBV case management forms, working with families of child survivors, IPV, the cycle of IPV, and survivor documentation. The training, took place from 20 to 22 March %100 .2017 of the attendees showed improvement in knowledge and all reported positive feedback about the training.

Also as a part of the capacity building initiative, UNFPA and GBV sub-cluster arranged a one-day workshop on GBV referral on 23 March 2017 for health and PSS workers. The topics included GBV referral terms and information, informed consent, roles and responsibilities, the referral pathway, and procedures for making referrals. A total of 11) 24F, 13M) participants attended including 1) 2F, 1M) based inside Syria and 2 men based in both Syria and Turkey. According to the pre and post scores, %87 of participants improved knowledge, while %100 reported positive feedback about the training.

The month of March marks the conclusion of this phase of the capacity building initiative that started in 2016, which included a number of trainings on RH and GBV and targeted both PSS providers and Health Workers from both Turkey and Syria. UNFPA with the GBV Sub-Cluster arranged a one day conclusion day to mark the event.

The RH working group worked on the essential drug list and medical material for secondary care services. The list was shared with the focal points of the health cluster to be integrated in the common health cluster document.

A training for midwives was organized in Gaziantep and 23 midwives from Syria attended the training. The content focused on Newborn care including resuscitation (3 days), Postpartum care including prevention and management of post-partum hemorrhage (3 days), IYCF (1 day), assessment of midwives practice and needs through FGD (1 day). After 8 months of collaborative work with professional in and out of Syria, the Midwifery Training Strategy was launched.

LEBANON

UNFPA co-leads, with UNHCR and the Ministry of Social Affairs, the monthly National SGBV Task Force meeting. At the most recent meeting, the 2017 work plan was reviewed and endorsed and the UNFPA-UNDP led desk review on involving men and boys was approved.





JORDAN

Basima [name changed for protection], is a 16 year old girl living in Zaatari camp who joined the UNFPA supported Youth Center five months ago. After she completed basic trainings, she enrolled in sports activities and was very committed to attending daily fitness activities. In the beginning, the female sports coaches noted that Basima was very shy and isolated from other girls. They monitored and supervised her situation carefully, gently encouraging her to embrace the group spirit. After much attention and encouragement from the sports coaches, she began to make new friends and seemed to change her perspective on the people around her. The sports coaches believe that Basima was not interested or comfortable mixing with the new group of people when she first came because she was very overweight. She had not been attending school for some time, due to verbal abuse she faced there because of her weight. After joining sports activities at the Youth Center, not only did she lose 14kg in less than 3 months due to her daily attendance and diligence, but also the team noted that her self-confidence and self-esteem had increased and she was able to become more involved with the group of girls, and to joke and enjoy with them. Happily, Basima is back in school after regaining a more positive sense of body image through sports.

"I am really enjoying my time at the center and have met the women of the Camp". (woman, 19, IDP camp in Quneitra governorate.

"I am asking in my name and in the name of all the women of AlAmal Camp that you extend the knitting course; there are many things that we still want to learn". (woman, 32, IDP camp in Quneitra governorate).

"Thank you so much for the Dignity Kits. I liked the Abaya the most because it is expensive and we cannot afford it". (Woman, 27, IDP camp in Quneitra governorate)

"The place is nice for women get-togethers and casual chatting; we really feel comfortable. The activities are entertaining and beneficial". (Woman, 18, IDP camp in Quneitra governorate)

LEBANON

"Now I feel Ism different as if Ism not the old me I had been- Beneficiary receiving individual counseling".

"I now know what is self-esteem, thanks to your help.- Beneficiary receiving individual counseling".

"I couldn't afford the transportation costs to go to the gynecologist at the clinic every month, bringing the MMU to us every week have saved time and money for us".

"We didn't attend another mother day ceremony since we have been in Syria, thank you to make us feel home".

"I don't go out of my home since I am in Egypt, except for going to Sanad safe space."

TURKEY-CROSS BORDER

Finally, the center opened again! I have been waiting for it.» a women commented on re-openning a womens center in northern Aleppo. The center was closed due to lack of funds, UNFPA supported the IP to re-launch the services under the commitment of services continuity assurance.



REGIONAL SITUATION REPORT FOR SYRIA CRISIS



CHALLENGES

TURKEY - cross border program into Syria

In addition to the security situation and continued instability, other challenges include difficulties of conducting training session for field staff and lack of specialized human resource.

FGYPT

The return of Syrian women again after the period of cut-off activities requires an extraordinary effort from the team. This month the number of new refugees has increased due to new Syrian arrivals from Sudan.

JORDAN- cross border programme into Syria

In mid-February, fighting erupted in Dara 'aCity which caused displacement of families in the region and a suspension of cross-border convoys - UNFPA's shipment of emergency RH kits was delayed until March when the border reopened. The Dara'a City battle was then followed by large advance and territorial gain by ISIL-affiliate Jayesh Khalid bin Walid (JKBW) in Western Dara'a in late February. One of UNFPA's supported facilities in Tassil has been taken over by JKBW forces and is currently unreachable at this time. The security situation mentioned above also impacted service delivery with fewer beneficiaries attending PHCs and WGSSs in the surrouding areas of Quneitra and Western Dara'a.

CHALLENGES

TURKEY

Economic problems faced by Syrian refugees still hinder them from reaching or participating in activities.

The security threat outside the borders of Turkey has had an indirect negative impact on the on-going programme.

The language barrier is still limiting access to some of the services especially in the field of health (lack of Arabic speaking psychologists, social workers, doctors, etc.).

Ineffective access to justice, unemployment and the increased tension between the refugee population and the host community are some of the other major challenges faced in Turkey.

SYRIA

The timely delivery of humanitarian assistance, is challenging due to evolving security conditions especially in Hama; Deir-Ez-Zor , Hasakeh, Dara'a and Idleh

Bureaucratic hurdles for approving joint UN convoys and AWPs are also affecting the ability of UN agencies to deliver humanitarian response to the affected governorates including the besieged areas.

Humanitarian actors and aid workers, who are trying to gather and verify information of the needs and progress of the humanitarian response, face multiple barriers, including limited access, bombardments, and kidnappings.
